		The <u>Staff and Volunteer Confidentiality Policy</u> and <u>Pupil Confidentiality Policy</u> are followed at all times – this includes withholding the names of staff, volunteers and pupils with either confirmed or suspected cases of coronavirus.				
[Updated] Poor hygiene practice		 Infection control procedures are adhered to as much as possible in accordance with the Infection Control Policy and relevant guidance from the DfE and PHE. Posters are displayed throughout the camp reminding pupils to wash their hands regularly, e.g. before entering and leaving the camp. Pupils wash their hands with soap and hot water before and after breaktimes and lunchtimes for no less than 20 seconds. Additional alcohol-based sanitiser (that contains no less than 60 percent alcohol) is provided for use where social distancing cannot be adhered to. Sufficient amounts of soap (or hand sanitiser where applicable), hot water, paper towels and lidded bins are supplied in all toilets and kitchen areas. Bar soap is not used, in line with the Infection Control Policy – liquid soap dispensers are installed and used instead. Pupils are supervised by staff when washing their hands to ensure it is done correctly, where necessary. Pupils are instructed to cough or sneeze into their inner elbow and use a tissue to cover their mouths and noses where possible, disposing of the tissue in lidded bins. Pupils clean their hands after they have coughed or sneezed. Pupils do not share cutlery, cups, drinks or food. [EYFS] The camp assesses the ability of EYFS pupils to follow infection control procedures, and additional measures are put in place if they require extra support to follow these measures, e.g. telling stories to support them in understanding how to follow rules. [Pupils with SEND] The camp assesses the ability of pupils with SEND to follow infection control procedures, and additional measures are put in place if they require extra support to follow these measures. 		 Pupils whose behaviour is purposefully contrary to the infection control measures in place will be disciplined in line with the <u>Behavioural Policy</u>. 				
[Updated] III health		 The camp is consistent in its approach to the management of suspected and confirmed cases of coronavirus. Staff are informed of the symptoms of possible coronavirus infection, e.g. a cough, difficulty breathing and a high temperature, and are kept up-to-date with national guidance about the signs, symptoms and transmission of coronavirus. Any pupil who displays signs of being unwell is immediately referred to the MW/CK. Where MW/CK are unavailable, staff act in line with the Infection Control Policy and ensure that any unwell pupils are moved to an empty room whilst they wait for their parent to collect them. Pupils displaying symptoms of coronavirus do not come into contact with other pupils and as few staff as possible, whilst still ensuring the pupil is safe. The relevant member of staff calls for emergency assistance immediately if the pupil's symptoms worsen. The parents of an unwell pupil are informed of the situation as soon as possible by a member of staff. Where contact with a pupil's parents cannot be made, appropriate procedures are followed in accordance with those outlined in governmental guidance and the Infection Control Policy. Unwell pupils who are waiting to go home are kept in an area where they can be at least two metres away from others. Areas used by unwell pupils who need to go home are thoroughly cleaned once vacated. If unwell pupils are waiting to go home, they are instructed to use different toilets to the rest of the camp to minimise the spread of infection. Parents are advised to contact 999 if their child becomes seriously ill or their life is at risk. 	Y	MW	20.07.2020	<u>M</u>

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		 Any medication given to ease the unwell individual's symptoms, e.g. paracetamol, is administered in accordance with the <u>Administering Medications Policy</u>. PPE is worn where required. Parents are informed via <u>letter</u> not to bring their children to camp or onto the camp premises if they show signs of being unwell and/or believe they have been exposed to coronavirus. Pupils who have displayed symptoms of coronavirus self-isolate for 14 days before returning to camp. Unwell pupils, staff, and those that have been in contact with them have access to testing. If a test comes back positive, the close contacts of the person with coronavirus are required to self-isolate for 14 days before returning to camp. 				
[New] Insufficient cleaning		 The <u>SBM</u> monitors the cleaning standards of camp cleaning contractors and discusses any additional measures required to prevent the spread of coronavirus. The <u>SBM</u> arranges enhanced cleaning to be undertaken where required – advice about enhanced cleaning protocols is sought from the local HTP. Spillages of bodily fluids, e.g. respiratory and nasal discharges, are cleaned up immediately in line with the <u>Infection Control Policy</u>, using PPE at all times. All shared camp equipment, such as cups, plates, and utensils, is thoroughly cleaned before and after use. Cleaners are employed by the camp to carry out daily, thorough cleaning that follows national guidance and is compliant with the <u>COSHH Policy</u> and the <u>Health and Safety Policy</u>. [New] Lack of social distancing		 Social distancing measures are implemented in line with the <u>Social Distancing Policy Statement</u>. Pupils are kept in small groups, or 'bubbles', of <u>15</u> or less, with the same teacher each day, and are not permitted to mix with other groups. Pupils queue two metres apart at entrances and exits. Pupils sit at least two chairs away from their peers in classrooms and at lunchtime where possible. 				

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		 Lesson start and end times are staggered to reduce the number of pupils in the corridors at once. Breaktimes and lunchtimes are staggered to reduce the number of pupils congregating in break and lunch areas at once. Pick-up and drop-off times are staggered to reduce the number of parents on or near the camp premises at once. The camp implements other social distancing measures where necessary, e.g. one-way systems in busy corridors and staircases. [EYFS] The camp assesses the ability of EYFS pupils to follow social distancing procedures, and additional measures are put in place if they require extra support to follow these measures, e.g. telling stories to support them in understanding how to follow rules. [Pupils with SEND] The camp assesses the ability of pupils with SEND to follow social distancing procedures, and additional measures are put in place if they require extra support to follow these measures. Pupils whose behaviour is purposefully contrary to the social distancing measures in place will be disciplined in line with the Behavioural Policy. Parents are informed of the social distancing rules they must follow on or near the camp premises, e.g. not congregating outside the camp when waiting to pick up their children. 				
[Updated] Lack of communication		 The <u>camp staff</u> report immediately to <u>MW</u> about any cases of suspected coronavirus, even if they are unsure. <u>MW</u> contacts the parents immediately about any suspected cases of coronavirus, even if they are unsure, and discusses if any further action needs to be taken. Camp put into place any actions or precautions advised by their local Health Protection Team (HPT). Keep pupils and parents adequately updated about any changes to infection control procedures as necessary. Communicate with parents via <u>letter</u> regarding any changes to camp procedures which are affected by the coronavirus pandemic, whether their child will be able to attend camp, and what protective measures the camp is implementing to keep their child safe. 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		 Pupils attending camp are informed of social distancing rules and how to maintain good levels of personal hygiene. Staff are kept informed of infection control arrangements and changes to procedures, including any decisions to reopen the camp to more pupils. <u>MW/CK</u> are actively present around camp to provide additional support, advice and reassurance. The camp provides opportunities for pupils and staff to talk about their 				
[New] Poor mental health and safeguarding		 mental health and experiences during the pandemic. Pupils have access to pastoral support and activities, e.g. opportunities to renew and develop friendships. Staff are vigilant in discerning pupil mental health and report any concerns to the MW/CK. Staff are sensitive to pupils' needs and worries. Safeguarding issues are managed in line with the Child Protection and Safeguarding Policy. Bereavement is managed in line with the Bereavement Policy. MW/CK consider the mental health needs of staff and implements flexible working practices where needed. The camp has a trained DSL on site – where this is not possible, a trained DSL working from home is able to be contacted remotely, or the camp shares a DSL with another camp. Vulnerable pupils attend camp, unless this is deemed unsafe and/or it is decided by the DSL and their parents that this goes against the pupil's best interests. Where needed, the camp carries out a Coronavirus (COVID-19): Return to Camp Risk Assessment for Individual Pupils. The children of critical workers attend camp. The camp takes an attendance register and completes the DfE's online Educational Setting Status form.

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		 The camp manages the use of parents' and pupils' contact details in line with the <u>Data Protection Policy</u> and <u>Records Management Policy</u>, e.g. collecting emails to send camp work to pupils. MW liaises with other camps to find pupils temporary places at a different camp if their usual camp has to close. <u>MW</u> does not accept pupils from other camps on this occasion due to the coronavirus pandemic. <u>MW/CK</u> ensure there are enough staff in camp to cover the number of pupils in attendance, as well as additional staff to cover staff who may become absent due to illness. Where needed, the camp carries out a <u>Coronavirus (COVID-19): Working on the Camp Site Risk Assessment for Individual Staff.</u> Extremely clinically vulnerable staff must not attend work and are supported to work from home where possible. <u>MW/CK</u> decide whether wrap-around care, e.g. breakfast club, will be provided at this time. A separate risk assessment is carried out for each form of wrap-around care provision before it resumes. Following the risk assessment, <u>MW/CK</u> decides whether the wrap-around care will resume and, if so, on what terms it will operate, such as: Pupils stay in the same groups that they are in during lessons. Pupils follow social distancing strictly. 				
Vacant premises		 Access to the camp is restricted – additional security is arranged and put in place in line with the <u>Security Policy</u>. <u>MW</u> and <u>CK</u> remain on site/ on call in case of an emergency or if access to the camp is required. External signage is visible to show that the camp is closed to pupils outside of St-Christopher's Catholic Primary School children and that access is restricted. Valuable camp property and equipment is identified and reasonable measures are put in place to ensure security. MW/CK ensure the camp premises is safe to return to before camp activity resumes. 				

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		 Any hazards are reported to MW/CK as soon as possible and issues are resolved prior to camp returning to usual business. MW/CK ensure the camp reopens only when it is safe and advisable to do so, in line with local and national advice. 				
[Updated] Emergencies		 All pupils' emergency contact details are up-to-date, including alternative emergency contact details, where required. Pupils' parents are contacted as soon as possible in the event of an emergency. Pupils' alternative contacts are called where their primary emergency contact cannot be contacted. The camp has an up-to-date <u>First Aid Policy</u> in place which outlines the management of medical emergencies – medical emergencies are managed in line with this policy. <u>MW</u> reviews whether adjustments need to be made to the fire drill – this is practised each time the number of pupils attending camp changes significantly.
